

UNIVERSAL SUMMARY OF GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS (P. 20)

All Degree Candidates must complete the following requirements. (Refer to full length policies listed within this section of the University Catalog.)

Update to policy noted only.

Achieve a minimum of a C- (1.667 quality points) in any major or minor required course (allied courses are not included in this policy). Some departments may carry higher grading requirements to progress within the major.

MAJOR RELATED REQUIREMENT (p. 33)

All students must pass the senior capstone experience in at least one major. This requirement will be determined separately for each major. Students must fulfill this requirement through courses taken at Heidelberg University. The capstone requirement provides an experience which connects learning and doing. It requires the student to synthesize theory, knowledge and experience. Students have the opportunity to reflect upon their learning experiences while at Heidelberg.

ACCOUNTING (p. 45)

The School of Business requires students majoring in Business Administration, Accounting or Economics to earn a grade of C- or better in each required pre-professional and professional core course.

ATHLETICS COACHING (p. 46)

Assistant Professor McDonald (chair).

Minor in Athletics Coaching (17 semester hours): HHP 203; 211; 5 hours from HHP 204, 205, 206, 207, 208, 209, 210, 339; 302; 316; 317; and 454.

BIOCHEMISTRY (p. 50, 51)

Biochemistry Major (53 semester hours): CHM 111, 112, 201, 202, 305, 307, 311, 316, 316L, 416, 416L, 422 (Senior Capstone Experience), and 3 additional CHM credit hours (300 or higher), or BIO 318, 325, or 329; BIO 123, 123L, 223, 224. CHM 103/L, 105, 108, and 205 may not be used toward major hours. Allied Courses: 8 semester hours of PHY 101, 102; 6 semester hours of MTH 222, 223.

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (p. 51)

The School of Business requires students majoring in Business Administration, Accounting or Economics to earn a grade of C- or better in each required pre-professional and professional core course.

CHEMISTRY (p. 53)

Chemistry Major (40 semester hours): CHM 111, 112, 201, 202, 305, 307, 311, 316, 316L, 422 (Senior Capstone Experience), and 6 additional CHM credit hours at the 300 or 400 level. CHM 103/L, 105, 108, and 205 may not be used toward major hours. Allied Courses: 4 semester hours of BIO 123, 123L; 8 semester hours of PHY 101, 102; 6 semester hours of MTH 222, 223.

Chemistry Minor: 20 semester hours to include CHM 111, 112, 201, plus 8 hours from any additional chemistry course courses excluding CHM 103/L, 105, and 108.

ECONOMICS (p. 55)

The School of Business requires students majoring in Business Administration, Accounting or Economics to earn a grade of C- or better in each required pre-professional and professional core course.

EARLY CHILDHOOD GENERALIST ENDORSEMENT (P. 57)

The Early Childhood Generalist Endorsement enables Early Childhood (pre-kindergarten through Grade 3) majors to broaden the scope of their license so they also can teach fourth and fifth grades. The endorsement may only be added to an Early Childhood License. In order to add the endorsement, candidates must successfully (see Major and Minor Grade Requirements) complete the following courses: EDU 207, 218, 227, 324; HIS 107 and HIS 120.

Candidates are required to pass specific OAE assessments in order to apply for this endorsement. Taking and passing the licensure tests prior to graduation and/or student teaching is encouraged but not required.

TUITION AND FEES 2016-2017 (p. 159)

HYPE Co-Curricular Program (p. 135) To be adopted Summer, 2017

The HYPE Co-Curricular Program is now the HYPE Career Ready Program. A transition plan was adopted to facilitate those students participating in the HYPE Program into the revised program requirements. First, HYPE Speakers will begin to carry one HYPE Unit. The required number of Speaker attendance has been adjusted so no substitutions or changes are necessary. Second, all HYPE Sessions offered in 2016-2017 will be classified as 200-level HYPE Skill sessions. Specifically, students who took a 100, 300 or 400-level HYPE session will see those credits re-categorized into the 200-level requirement.

Students following degree requirements under the 2016-2017 Undergraduate Catalog will complete one of the following alternative plans.

- Students who entered Heidelberg with 23 credit hours or less will complete 43 HYPE Units. Students must complete 13 units at the 100 level, 24 units at the 200 level across all six HYPE Skills, 3 units at the 300 level; and 3 units at the 400 level.
- Students who entered Heidelberg with 24-55 credit hours will complete 26 HYPE Units. Students must complete 8 units at the 100 level; 12 units at the 200 level across all six HYPE Skills; 3 units at the 300 level; and 3 units at the 400 level.
- Students who entered Heidelberg with 56-87 credit hours will complete 12 HYPE Units. Students must complete 3 units at the 100 level; 6 units at the 200 level; 3 units at the 300 or 400 level.
- Students who entered Heidelberg with 88+ credit hours must contact the HYPE Career Ready Program Director for a personal evaluation.

In summary, students will need to register for the remaining speakers required. At the beginning of the fall semester, during HYPE Registration, students must review any remaining 200-level HYPE Skill Sessions and schedule accordingly. The HYPE Skills at the 300 and 400-levels will be experiential learning opportunities. The HYPE Career Ready Program Director will make those opportunities known to students via announcements.
